

OVERVIEW

Tahoe Resources Inc. (“**Tahoe**”), recognizes that it may, at times, receive requests for support from the public security forces of the countries in which it operates. In accordance with the international guidelines to which the Company aligns, this document outlines Tahoe’s policy when providing such support. Public security forces must review and commit to abide with the following Tahoe Resources’ Policies available at www.tahoeresources.com, and understand and agree to follow the applicable requirements set forth therein:

- Tahoe Resources’ Code of Business Conduct;
- Tahoe Resources’ Corporate Social Responsibility Policy;
- Tahoe Resources’ Human Rights Policy; and
- Tahoe Resources’ Anti-Corruption Policy.

Tahoe’s Anti-Corruption Policy is highly relevant to these matters and should be reviewed for compliance in conjunction with this Policy.

OUR COMMITMENT

LIMITS REGARDING SUPPORT

Tahoe and all of its subsidiaries observe the following limits regarding the support it provides to the public security forces of the countries in which it operates:

1. Any request for support shall be communicated in writing and in a transparent manner through appropriate channels.

Donations will not be provided directly to any public security force. Any support provided will be by means of direct payment to the company providing the service or supplying the equipment. Non-exhaustive examples of items in this category are:

- Any type of vehicle repair
 - Any type of office administrative equipment
 - Fuel
 - Food
2. Regarding the donation of equipment, Tahoe and any of its subsidiaries will not supply equipment, or provide support in the purchase of equipment, that could potentially endanger life, be construed as a threat to life, cause harm, or contravene the human rights of an individual. This prohibition extends to auxiliary equipment required in the use of lethal, potentially lethal, or harmful items.

Non- exhaustive examples of items in this category are:

- Any type of firearm

- Non-lethal weapons (including, but not limited to, firearms with non-lethal ammunition, any form of incapacitator such as tazers, pepper spray, etc.)
- Batons, shields
- Any type of equipment designed to restrict movement (handcuffs, etc.)
- Any type of technical equipment that could be used for covert policing practices (including, covert cameras, listening devices, GPS tracking devices etc.), or any type of biometric equipment unless related to internal access control.

SUPPORT GUIDELINES

Tahoe and any of its subsidiaries may provide support to public security forces if the following guidelines are met:

1. All requests must be documented in a letter signed by a senior officer of the public security force, confirming that he/she is making the request in his/her official capacity on behalf of the security force entity, directed to in country management of one of Tahoe's subsidiaries. Requests should be made through official channels and in a transparent manner.
2. The donation request, the delivery of the support and all other matters related to the donation must be fully and accurately documented.
3. The donation arrangement and agreement provisions must be pre-approved by the local Legal Department, which must confirm that the donation is permissible under local laws and will advise on required contractual provisions, due diligence and on-going monitoring for compliance with this Policy and Tahoe Anti-Corruption Policy, in particular, its prohibitions on bribery and requirements for full and accurate recording of donations.
4. Donations of funds must be made through some form of transparent payment mechanism, such as bank transfer – not in cash.
5. The support requested must assist the public security force in carrying out their duties to the benefit of the whole community, and must not be intended to benefit any individual security officer, government official or other particular individual.
6. The public security force must act in a manner consistent with national laws as well as human rights standards and international humanitarian law.
7. Tahoe or any of its subsidiaries has the right to monitor or conduct an independent audit to determine the appropriate use of any of its donations and may require the security force to certify that the donations were used for their intended purposes.
8. The agents of the public security force requiring support have not previously been involved in any human rights abuses or misconduct. If an allegation of a human rights abuse is pending against the public security force or its agents, the security force must demonstrate that the individuals involved in the matter are being investigated. Tahoe and each of its subsidiaries reserve the right to withhold support until the matter has been resolved. If Tahoe or any of its subsidiaries have any reason to believe, or suspect, that the public security force is using items supplied by Tahoe or its subsidiaries for any activity that violates, or could potentially violate human rights or any law, that support will be stopped immediately and the incident reported to the appropriate authorities.
9. The service or equipment request does not contravene points 1 and 2 under Limits Regarding Support in this policy.

Any exception to this policy must receive approval from the in-country legal department.

In the event of national unrest, or nationwide military action, all donations would be indefinitely suspended and a full review of this policy and associated processes completed, in consultation with in-country and international human rights groups.
